From the Desk of the City Manager

Sometimes those things which are right in front of us on a daily basis become so routine and familiar that we don't notice them anymore. Such can be the case with Economic Development, and the companies and businesses that are growing and prospering within our City. Their success creates a momentum and synergy in the community positively affecting other businesses; as is the case with AT&T's recent addition of over 200 employees to their downtown facility.

Over the past year there have been many developments in Downtown Saginaw that includes the Central City area, Celebration Square, and Old Town. Many additional upgrades are being planned for the future as well.

There are so many success stories that do not garner mainstream media attention and therefore go unnoticed by the majority. Recently, the Mayor, City Council and staff were invited to tour Merrill Technologies to see first-hand the investment and success of their operations. This is one of many prospering businesses committed to the City of Saginaw and investing in its future.

Additional success stories this year include Duperon Corporation, who recently held its grand opening after consolidating its manufacturing, design and headquarters at 1200 Leon Scott. Fullerton Tool Company continues to work with the City of Saginaw on its expansion project that required road acquisition adjacent to the company's facility, and anticipates beginning construction in mid-summer. TSSF Architects, Inc. purchased 122 N. Washington Avenue, which is a historical building it had been leasing, and will renovate its offices and add lofts.

There are times we can forget the progress that has been made. One such example is Washington Avenue. The City has benefited from planned improvements to the Washington Avenue corridor, which has been made possible and implemented through private investment and public funds.

I encourage you to be a part of the revitalization of Saginaw through buying locally or seeking services from providers within the City. Other ways to support the City include joining the efforts of one of the many organized groups who beautify city parks and common areas. Together we can make Saginaw a better place to live, work, and play.

CURRENT RECYCLING TOTALS:

In 2012, we recycled 27,320 lbs. of paper and 3,200 lbs. of plastic, cans and glass!!!

In 2012, we avoided the use of:

- 95,500 gallons of water
- 45 cubic yards of landfill space
- 41 barrels of oil
- 232 trees
- 54,600 kilowatts of electricity

2013 Road Construction Season

Once again, it's almost road construction season. Orange barrels and detours will be appearing around the region and Saginaw has its share of local road projects lined up for this year. The 2013 season will involve a variety of projects including complete road reconstructions, water main replacements, road resurfacings, traffic signal improvements, and LED street lighting upgrades. While the outcome is always better in the end, dealing with road construction season can be a challenge. Below is a list of Saginaw's upcoming projects and the tentative construction dates to help you navigate the construction zones.

Major projects include:

- Ezra Rust Boulevard– Court Street Bridge to Washington (M-13) – April 15 to August 9
- Fordney Street – Rust (M-46) to Ezra Rust – April 15 to August 9
- Harrison Street – W. Remington to Eleanor – July 1 to August 16
- Holden Street – Franklin to Washington (M-13) – May 13 to June 28
- Michigan Avenue – Remington to State (M-58) with more extensive work at W. Genesee – April 15 to September 27

Resurfacing projects include:

- Benjamin Street– Union to State – May 13 to June 28
- Fayette Street – Holland to Remington – July 1 to August 16
- Harrison Street – Eleanor to Houghton – July 1 to August 16
- Holden Street – Franklin to Sheridan – May 13 to June 28



Lighting upgrades:

- Hamilton Street – Van Buren to Court – July 8 to August 2

Downtown Development Authority Helping Move Saginaw Forward

Over the past year there have been many changes in Downtown Saginaw. Downtown Saginaw includes the Central City area, Celebration Square and Old Town. Many additional changes are being planned for the future as well. With the demolition of the hotel and International Center on Johnson Street, the Saginaw County Building Authority with SMG Management Group are in the process of raising funds and designing an outdoor pavilion that will complement The Dow Event Center. SMG Management is looking to host 8 to 9 outdoor concerts a year in addition to activities and festivals throughout the spring, summer and fall seasons.

Construction is nearing completion on the new Michigan Works! training center on Genesee Avenue. Construction is on track to be completed by June. At full capacity, there will be approximately 90 employees.

Team One Credit Union has recently purchased property from the DDA and the City on Genesee and Franklin to construct an ATM. The ATM should be installed this year. Michigan Photo has also purchased property from the DDA behind their building to create off-street parking and enhance the parking lot.

The Bancroft and Eddy projects are in full swing. Work has begun renovating the Eddy building, which consists of 30 one and two-bedroom apartment units. The apartments will be upgraded with wood floors, new appliances, granite kitchen counter tops and new light fixtures. The exterior of the Eddy building will be cleaned and repaired. Units are expected to be available in June. Work will start soon on the Bancroft building, which has 120 one-bedroom units. A new martini and wine bar has been signed as a tenant and additional tenants are being sought for both buildings. The project owners have purchased additional lots on Washington Avenue to expand parking for both the residential and commercial uses. Medwins Pharmacy has been purchased by a pharmacy group from Genesee County and will be relocating to the Commerce Center in April.

Several new projects are expected in Old Town in the next several months. March begins the monthly bar owners' specials with Martini, Wine, and Beer walks planned through August. The Hamilton Square apartments are leased at full capacity and a new face is expected for the commercial component of the project in the next several months. The Hamilton Street reconstruction project being handled by the City may impact access to businesses and parking over the next two years, but the City will work with the property owners to have as minimal impact as possible. The project will result in an upgraded street and streetscape that will benefit businesses and visitors.

The Riverfront Development Commission will be hosting their annual Spring Clean-up, which will focus on Celebration Square and the Japanese Garden area. Anyone interested in assisting on May 15th at 8:00 a.m. should contact Sue Seibel at 989-759-1776.
