It is recommended that the 2009/2010 Approved Budget for the following funds

be amended:

The General Fund Revenues (101) should be decreased by \$1,835,383 from

\$35,951,817 to \$34,116,434. General Expenditures will be decreased by the same

amount.

Major Street Fund's (202) Street Administration Division should be increased

from \$695,353 to \$707,203, which equates to an \$11,850 increase. Available fund

balance will offset this increase.

Local Street Fund's (203) Street Administration Division should be increased

from \$608,253 to \$620,103, which equates to an \$11,850 increase. Available fund

balance will offset this increase.

The Economic Development Fund's (244) Federal Grant Account (244-0000-

513.58-35) should be increased from \$0 to \$17,037 for the City received monies from

the ASAP Grant. Likewise, the Professional Services Account (244-6064-761.80-01)

should be increased by the same amount.

The Community Police Fund's (260) Department of Justice Account (260-0000-

513.58-27) should be increased from \$0 to \$25,234. This amount represents the COPS

Hiring Grant that the City was awarded in FY 2010. To offset the increase in revenues,

there will be an increase in expenditures in the COPS Hiring Grant Division's Salaries

Account (260-3328-741.70-01) for the same amount.

The Drug Forfeiture Fund's (264) Federal Grant Account No. (264-0000-513.58-35) should be increased from \$0 to \$9,670, which represents the monies received for the Bullet Proof Vest Grant. To offset the increase in revenues, there will be an increase in the Parts and Supplies Account No. (264-3040-731.73-30) by the same amount.

The Youth Initiative Fund's (265) Reimbursement Account No (265-0000-602.68-08) should be increased from \$0 to \$18,990. This is a reimbursement for incurred overtime costs for the Youth Initiative Program that the City participate in with Saginaw County, Michigan State Police, and the School Districts. The increase in revenues will be offset by the increase in Overtime (265-3325-741.70-10.)

The Celebration Park Fund's (508) Transfers from Other Funds Account No. (508-0000-691.69-01) should be increased from \$0 to \$107,262. The City will be utilizing the remaining balance of the Mershon – Whittier Trust Fund to continue the construction on Celebration Park. To offset the increase in revenues, there will be an increase in the Construction Project Account No. (508-7580-831.80-47) by the same amount.

The Wave Pool Fund's (587) Fund Balance Account No. (587-0000-680.00-00) should be increased from \$0 to \$107,262. This increase represents the remaining balance in the Mershon – Whittier Trust Fund. Likewise, Operating Transfers to Other Funds, Account No. (587-9660-831.87-01) should be increased by the same amount.

The Sewer Operations and Maintenance Fund's (590) Federal Grants Account No. (590-0000-513.58-35) should be decreased from \$874,727 to \$481,100, which equates to a decrease of \$393,627. The City anticipated receiving monies from EPA for

FY 2005 and 2006. The City will only receive a portion of the monies in FY 2010. To offset the decrease in federal grant monies, there will be an increase in the Use of Fund Equity (590-0000-680.00-00) in the same amount. An available appropriation of retained earnings will offset the difference.

The Public Works Building Fund's (641) Contribution from Other Funds Account No. (641-0000-539.64-80) should be decreased from \$465,508 to \$423,729, which equates to \$41,779 reduction. The reduction in revenues will be offset by a reduction in the Miscellaneous/Increase in Fund Equity Account No. (641-8559-771.90-00) by the same amount.

The Technical Services – Geographical Information System Fund (650) Public Works Building Rental Account No. (650-1738-781.79-40) should be increased by \$2,985. This increase will be offset by available fund balance.

The Motor Pool Operations (661) will be increased by \$28,351 from \$2,581,672 to \$2,610,023. The increase in the fund will be offset by an increase in the use of retained earnings.

Justification:

This budget adjustment reflects all adjustments to FY 2010 for revenues and expenditures that were previously budgeted but will not be received or recognized, as well as those that were received and not budgeted.

Manager's Recommendation:

I recommend that the lease agreement with Team Financial Group, Inc. for a ScanPro 2000 Digital Microfilm Scanner be approved. The lease is \$198.28 per month for a term of 60 months and includes a \$1 buyout at the end of the lease. It has been approved by the City Manager as to substance and the City Attorney as to form.

This vendor meets all requirements of §14.23, "Vendors", of "Purchasing, Contracting and Selling Procedure," of Chapter 14, "Finance and Purchasing, of Title 1, "General Provisions" of the Saginaw Code of Ordinances O-1.

Funds are available in the City Clerk's Operating Services Account, No. 101-1731-701.80-05.

Justification:

The State of Michigan has several Public Acts governing the availability of records, such as the Freedom of Information Act. Those acts require all government agencies that create electronic records be responsible for ensuring those records remain accessible for their entire retention period. The City has transferred many documents onto microfilm for permanent storage; however, the current microfilm reader is 20 years old and no longer capable of reading or printing a large portion of those microfilm cartridges. The new equipment would allow reading of all cartridges, scanning of new documents into digital format for storage, printing and emailing as needed, resulting in reduced staff time required to find and disseminate requested documents, as well as the ability to then store documents off-site while retaining immediate availability. Further, the city would realize additional cost savings at the end of the lease due to an approximate \$950 per year savings in maintenance costs.

Subject: Amendments to Encroachment and Sign Ordinances.

Manager's Recommendation:

I recommend approval of the ordinances introduced under the regular order of business, that amends § 96.45-96.59, "Encroachments", of Chapter 96, "Streets and Sidewalks," of Title IX, "General Regulations," and Section 307, "Annual License for Certain Signs," of § 150.21, "Sign Code Amendments," of Chapter 150, "Building Regulations," of Title XV, "Land Usage," of the City of Saginaw Code of Ordinances, O-1.

Justification:

The Licensed Inspector and City Clerk are in the process of reviewing fees charged for certain services and licenses provided by their respective divisions. The fee established for encroachments permits has not increased since 1999 and is currently, \$10.00 for 3 years. Many encroachments need routine inspections to insure the encroachment is being properly maintained and not causing a hazard or public safety issue, i.e. roof cornice, fence, awning, etc.

In addition to the foregoing, there are certain signs that hang on or over the street or walkway that can be potentially hazardous. The fee for these signs is currently \$5.00 annually and was established in 1993.

Under the revised ordinances, applications for an encroachment permit (including certain signs) will be reviewed by the Licensed Inspector. He/she shall first determine whether or not such encroachment, because of its nature, shall or shall not require regular inspections due to public safety and/or potential liability issues. Those encroachments not requiring routine inspections shall be graded Class I Encroachments with a fee of \$25.00 annually. Those encroachment that do require routine inspections shall be graded Class II Encroachments and have a \$50.00 annual fee. Application fees will not be prorated and will be non-refundable. A separate permit and fee will be charged for each encroachment on any one parcel.

In addition to determining the class of each encroachment, the Licensed Inspector shall also determine if the encroachment may present a liability issue to the City and in

such case, shall require the applicant to provide the City with a Certificate of Insurance in an appropriate amount naming the City of Saginaw as additional insured.

The encroachment ordinance amendment will also make billing less difficult by invoicing annually, instead of every 3 years. In this regard, all existing permits for encroachments issued prior to the effective date of this ordinance amendment shall expire on June 30, 2010, regardless of when they were issued during the prior 3-year license term. Encroachment permits shall fall due for renewal on or before June 30th of each year.

Other sections of the ordinance have been amended to provide for a late fee upon failure to obtain or renew a permit, and also to allow the Licensed Inspector to confiscate items and hold them for a period of 30 days. The owner of a held item may request its return by completing a form and paying a \$25.00 recovery fee. Items held beyond the 30-day period may be disposed of or sold by the City.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND §96.45-96.59, "ENCROACHMENTS," OF CHAPTER 96 "STREETS AND SIDEWALKS," OF TITLE IX, "GENERAL REGULATIONS," OF THE CITY OF SAGINAW CODE OF ORDINANCES O-1.

The City of Saginaw ordains:

Section 1. §96.45-96.59 of Chapter 96, "Streets and Sidewalks," of Title IX, "General Regulations," of the City of Saginaw Code of Ordinances, O-1, are hereby amended to read as follows:

ENCROACHMENTS

§ 96.45 DEFINITIONS.

The term *ENCROACHMENT* as used in this subchapter shall mean any of the following which is located on, over, in or under any roadway, sidewalk, alley or other public right of way: architectural projection including belt course, planter, mansard, cosmetic wall covering, roof cornice and wall buttress; awning; canopy; cellar entrance; coal hole; fence; manhole; marquee; sidewalk elevator; step or stair; fire escape; standpipe or sprinkler connection; sign; subgrade spread footing; underground conduit (private); wall; loading dock, platform or facility; hoistway opening; sidewalk vault; street vault; elevated craneway or walkway; any device or object, or anything specifically permitted by the Council and designated by it as an Encroachment subject to the provisions of this subchapter. The term *ENCROACHMENT* as used in this subchapter shall not include any of the following facilities owned by a public utility; overhead electric and telephone lines, poles and appurtenances; underground electric, telephone, gas and steam lines, together with tunnels and conduits therefore; nor shall said term include any Encroachment by a public utility permitted by the City and for which the utility company has agreed to hold the City harmless.

§ 96.46 PERMITS REQUIRED.

It shall be unlawful for any person to erect, build, maintain or relocate any Encroachment as defined in this subchapter, without first obtaining a permit from the Licensed Inspector of the Inspections Division or by Council approval as provided under

§ 96.50(B), paying the permit fee as required under § 96.51, and furnishing the necessary insurance certificate as defined under § 96.53, if applicable.

§ 96.47 APPLICATION FOR PERMIT.

Applications for Encroachment Permits (either existing or proposed) shall be made on a form provided by the Licensed Inspector of the Inspections Division and shall include the following information:

- (A) Name, address, and telephone number of applicant;
- (B) Location and type of the existing or proposed Encroachment, building to which attached or abutting lot which Encroachment serves, or if not abutting a privately owned lot, the location of Encroachment in street, alley or public way;
- (C) Blueprints or ink drawings showing the plans and specifications of the proposed Encroachment, if requested by the Licensed Inspector;
- (D) Such other information as the Licensed Inspector shall require in order to insure compliance with this subchapter and all other ordinances of the City and laws of the State of Michigan.

§ 96.48 ENCROACHMENT PERMIT CLASSIFICATIONS.

Upon receipt of an application for an Encroachment Permit, the Licensed Inspector shall determine whether or not such Encroachment, because of its nature, shall or shall not require regular inspections due to public safety and/or potential liability issues the Encroachment may present. Those Encroachments not requiring routine inspections shall be graded Class I Encroachments and those requiring routine inspections shall be graded Class II Encroachments, and fees shall be set accordingly as defined in § 96.51

§ 96.49 EXISTING ENCROACHMENTS.

All existing Encroachment permit holders shall be required to complete an application for permit as defined in § 96.47, including those permitted by special written agreement.

§ 96.50 APPROVAL OF ENCROACHMENTS BY LICENSED INSPECTOR.

(A) It shall be the duty of the Licensed Inspector to review the proposed Encroachment to ensure it does not pose an adverse affect to public safety or

convenience and where appropriate, shall order any necessary repairs, alterations or removal.

- (B) When the Encroachment meets all the requirements of this and any other ordinance of the City, including but not limited to §150.20-§150.21, referred to as the *Sign Code*, and the laws of the State of Michigan, the Licensed Inspector shall then issue an Encroachment Permit, provided the applicant pays the required fee as defined in § 96.51 and furnishes the necessary Certificate of Insurance as defined in § 96.53, if applicable. In the event the Licensed Inspector does not believe granting the Encroachment Permit would be in the best interest of the City, he may deny the granting of a permit.
- (C) If the applicant does not concur with the decision of the Licensed Inspector either to make repairs, alterations or removal, or the Licensed Inspector's decision to deny the application, the application shall be transmitted to the City Council for approval or disapproval. The decision of City Council shall be final.

§ 96.51 PERMIT FEES.

Each applicant shall pay an application fee as follows:

Class I Encroachment Permit: \$25.00 Annually (Routine Inspections Not Required)

Class II Encroachment Permit: \$50.00 Annually (Routine Inspections Required)

A separate permit and fee will be charged for each Encroachment on any one parcel. Application fees are not prorated and are non-refundable. All permits for Encroachments now existing or issued prior to the effective date of this ordinance shall expire on June 30, 2010. This includes all Encroachment Permit issued at any time during the prior three-year (3) license term. All Encroachment Permits shall require renewal on or before June 30th of each year.

§ 96.52 LATE PAYMENT PENALTY

An additional late charge of fifty (50%) percent of the permit fee shall be incurred as a result of the following:

(A) Failure to pay the initial Encroachment Permit fee within fifteen (15) days of application.

- (B) Failure to apply for an Encroachment Permit within fifteen (15) days of date of notice.
- (C) Failure to renew any/all Encroachment Permits within fifteen (15) days of permit expiration.

§ 96.53 INSURANCE REQUIREMENT.

- (A) Prior to the issuance of any Encroachment Permit, the Licensed Inspector shall determine if such Encroachment may present possible claims for personal injury, bodily injury or property damage due to its nature, and as a result may require the applicant to provide proof of liability insurance in an appropriate amount by a company authorized and accepted to do insurance business in the State of Michigan, specifically naming the City of Saginaw as additional insured and loss payee for any such claims.
- (B) In the event such proof of liability insurance is required, it shall be updated and provided to the City annually at the time of renewal.

§ 96.54 INSPECTION.

The Licensed Inspector shall inspect, at such time as he or she deems necessary, each Encroachment Permit granted to determine whether it is in need of repair or removal, and the permit fee shall be deemed to cover the costs of this inspection whether inspection be made annually or at other intervals.

§ 96.55 PERMIT REVOCABLE AT ANY TIME.

All rights and privileges acquired under the provisions of this subchapter or any amendment thereto are mere licenses, revocable at any time by the Licensed Inspector or City Council under the terms and provisions of this subchapter and all such permits shall contain this provision.

§ 96.56 REMOVAL OF ENCROACHMENT UPON FAILURE TO APPLY FOR PERMIT, PAY PERMIT FEE, OR MAINTAIN LIABILITY INSURANCE.

Upon failure of any person to make application for an Encroachment Permit where required, to pay the permit fee or maintain liability insurance, if applicable, the Licensed Inspector shall have the authority to remove said Encroachment immediately. Any item(s) confiscated pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be held by the City for a period of thirty (30) days. During the thirty (30) day holding period, the owner

of said item may request the return of the item on a form provided by the City Clerk. The Licensed Inspector shall check the inventory of confiscated items and if the item is found to be held by the City the applicant may pay a \$25.00 recovery fee for each item held at which time the Licensed Inspector shall return the item to the owner. After thirty (30) days have passed, the Licensed Inspector may dispose of said item(s) either by disposal in an appropriate landfill or by sale.

§ 96.57 REMOVAL OF UNSAFE ENCROACHMENTS.

Any Encroachment which has become unsafe or presents a hazard to the general public by reason of deterioration, dilapidation, lack of repair or maintenance, or any other cause which results in an unsafe condition to the general public in its use of the public right-of-way, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and shall be abated in the manner provided for removal of dangerous structures as provided in the Ordinances for Abatement of Dangerous Buildings, Structures or Parts thereof.

§ 96.58 TEMPORARY ENCROACHMENTS.

Applications and permits for temporary or intermittent Encroachments shall be obtained in the same manner as applications and permits are obtained for permanent Encroachments.

§ 96.59 DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY.

Wherever in this subchapter an act or duty is required to be performed by the Licensed Inspector of the Inspections Division, said act or duty may be delegated by the Licensed Inspector to any employee of said Division.

Manager's Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Base Fee in Paragraphs (B) "Plumbing Permit and

Inspection Fees," (C) "Electrical Permit and Inspection Fees" and (D) "Mechanical

Permit and Inspection Fees" of §150.02, "Fees," of Chapter 150, "Building Regulations,"

Justification:

The Licensed Inspector is in the process of reviewing fees charged for certain

services provided by the Inspections Division. The fees established for plumbing,

Currently, the base fee for plumbing, electrical and mechanical permit and

inspection fees is \$30.00. This fee no longer covers the cost of such inspections. In

addition, the State of Michigan has established a base fee of \$50.00 for such permit and

inspection fees. Given the foregoing, it is recommended that the City increase its base

fee by \$20 to cover its cost and to correspond to the fee charged by the State of

Michigan for the same service.

Subject: Application for Local Bridge Program Funds for fiscal year 2013.

Manager' Recommendation:

I recommend that the City of Saginaw actively seek Local Bridge Program Funds for

the rehabilitation/reconstruction of the Norman Street Bridge over Veterans Memorial

Parkway and for scour corrective action and preventative maintenance as needed for the

Johnson Street, Genesee Avenue, Holland Avenue and Center Street Bridges over the

Saginaw River. The application amount for each bridge will vary and will be based on the

needs of each individual bridge. If approved, funds for the City's share will be made

available in FY 2013/14 Major Streets Construction Projects Fund Account No. 202-4616-

781-8047. The City of Saginaw will be responsible for design and construction engineering

costs.

The Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) requires as part of the

application process, that a resolution be adopted by City Council indicating that the

application has been reviewed and that the City is actively seeking these funds for the

projects as stated above. This resolution appears under the regular order of business.

Justification:

Per the MDOT Local Bridge Program Guidelines, the total number of applications

from any local agency is limited to five (5). The preventative maintenance, structure

rehabilitation and replacement, and approach costs may be eligible for a maximum of 95

percent participation from federal and/or state funds. The right-of-way, design engineering

and construction engineering costs are not eligible for Local Bridge Program funds. Per the

City of Saginaw's most recent bi-annual bridge inspection reports, it is apparent that all of

the City of Saginaw's six (6) vehicular bridges are in need of preventative maintenance and some need scour corrective action. The Norman Street Bridge over Veterans Memorial Parkway was constructed in 1971 and has deteriorated to a point where it now needs rehabilitation or reconstruction. The remainder of the bridges are in need of preventative maintenance to avoid needing premature reconstruction. The Local Bridge Program was enacted in 2004 and is the federal legislation that provides funds for bridges. The MDOT has called for project applications from eligible communities who wish to participate in this program. The applications have to meet certain criteria and because of fund limitations, the applications are evaluated by MDOT and ranked against these criteria. As projects of this magnitude require substantial lead time to start of work, it is recommended that staff be directed to submit an application for funding no later than June 1, 2010, in order to qualify for consideration in the State's fiscal year 2013 funding program.
